PAUL N.J. OTTOSSON






CADE SAVAGE SCHWARTZ





PROFESSIONAL JUDGES



RAY D. KIM

Ray is a film composer, characterized by a distinct hybrid voice, blending traditional and contemporary elements into a richly melodic amalgamation of styles. His portfolio includes notable productions like AppleTV's "Lessons in Chemistry," HBO Max's "Hacks", and Netflix's "Griselda,"

demonstrating his remarkable versatility across styles and genres. In addition to his composition work, Ray is a skilled orchestrator who has contributed to projects such as Universal's "Speak No Evil," Netflix's "Terminator Zero," and AppleTV's "Presumed Innocent" series. Currently, Ray is composing for Netflix's "Department Q" and HBO Max's "Hacks" season 4. He is also working on a video game "Prometheus" set to release on Xbox, Playstation, Steam and Nintendo.



JEREMY BARBER

Jeremy Barber is a Partner in the Motion Picture Literary and Talent Departments at United Talent Agency. Prior to UTA, Barber was President of Catch 23 and Catch 23 UK, the production and management company which he helped found. During his tenure, Barber executive produced *One Hour*

Photo and King's Ransom. Barber was also head of Production and Acquisitions at Artisan Entertainment where he oversaw films such as Requiem for a Dream, The Blair Witch Project, and Buena Vista Social Club. Barber began his entertainment career as an attorney at Loeb & Loeb. Prior to Hollywood, Barber had a career in politics.



CHERI GAULKE

Cheri Gaulke is a pioneer in the feminist art movement in 1970s Los Angeles known for her performance art, public art commissions, and award-winning films. Gaulke has received artist fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts, California Arts Council, City of Los Angeles, California

Community Foundation, and California Humanities. She is proud to have taught at Harvard–Westlake for 31 years and been part of the beginnings of Westflix. She retired from teaching in 2019 to focus on *Acting Like Women*, a feature documentary about feminist performance art and the Woman's Building in 1970s–80s Los Angeles, which will be completed this year.



ANTHONY SPARKS

Anthony Sparks is a TV showrunner, writer-producer originally from Chicago's southside who began his career as an actor on Broadway and in regional theatre. He is a dedicated advocate for diversity and access in arts, entertainment, and education. In television, he was

the longtime showrunner for "Queen Sugar" (OWN) and also wrote and executive produced for "Mike" (Hulu) and "Bel-Air" (Peacock). Other credits include: "The Blacklist" and "Lincoln Heights". Sparks has made deals with Netflix, Blumhouse, Lionsgate, Legendary, Harpo and has sold drama series to Disney+, BET, HBO Max, among others. He earned a Humanitas Prize nomination, the NAACP Image Award for Best Drama, the Television Academy Honors Award, plus 4 NAACP Image nods for Outstanding Writing. Sparks holds a Ph.D., MA. and BFA from USC, is a professor and mentor and was recently honored with the 2024 naming of the Sparks Center for Community & Culture at the USC School of Dramatic Arts, with his wife Anita Dashiell-Sparks.



MAZ JOBRANI

Maz Jobrani is a comedian, actor and LA Times bestselling author of I'M NOT A TERRORIST, BUT I'VE PLAYED ONE ON TV. As an actor, he has made many appearances including GREY'S ANATOMY, CURB YOUR ENTHUSIASM, and SHAMELESS. Maz starred as the title character in

the award-winning indie comedy, JIMMY VESTVOOD: AMERIKAN HERO, a feature which he co-wrote and co-produced. He has co-starred in many additional films, including Sydney Pollack's THE INTERPRETER, Disney's DESCENDANTS and Ice Cube's FRIDAY AFTER NEXT. Maz's standup comedy specials include IMMIGRANT, which was a NETFLIX original, as well as 5 additional solo specials. Maz served as the host for the 45th International Emmy's in New York. Maz executive produced EVERYTHING MUST CHANGE, a documentary about his sister's battle with breast cancer which is currently available on iTunes.



KATLYN MINARD

Katlyn Minard is a documentary producer and archivist. Her recent TV credits include the news packages for the internationally broadcast *FireAid* Benefit Concert, the Paramount Plus revival of *Behind the Music*, and the CNN docuseries, See *It Loud: The History of Black Television*.

As an author, her work has received nominations for the Pushcart Prize, and been submitted for consideration for *The Best American Short Stories*. Her short fiction has appeared in various literary journals and magazines, including *Necessary Fiction, The Raven Review, 101 Words, Lunch Ticket,* and *Moon City Review.* You can find a full list of her credits and publications at katlyncarsonminard.com.

Liz Yale Marsh is a 2-time Emmy-winning, Grammy,
Peabody, and GLAAD-nominated documentary film and
television producer under an exclusive overall deal with

documentaries for the studio. Prior to joining UTAS, Liz most

recently produced the feature documentary *Little Richard: I Am Everything* directed by Lisa Cortes. She also recently produced the documentary short film *Facing the Falls*, directed by Celia Aniskovich and Executive Produced by Hillary and Chelsea Clinton. Previous work includes Executive Producing the Peacock 3-part documentary *Face to Face with Scott Peterson*, Executive Producing the criminal justice anthology series *It Couldn't Happen Here* for Sundance Channel/AMC+, and Executive Producing the CNN Original Series *Vegas: The Story of Sin.* Liz Co-Executive Produced the feature documentary film *The Panama Papers*, the NBC series *GIVE*, the 5-part Sundance Channel series *The Preppy Murder*, and the award-winning Lifetime documentary series *Surviving Jeffrey Epstein.* Liz was formerly the Head of Documentaries for production company Bungalow Media + Entertainment. Liz was awarded the President's Volunteer Service Award under President Barack Obama. She is the proud Founder of the WestFlix Film Festival.

FOUNDER'S AWARD

This prize is chosen by Liz Yale Marsh '04, a true cinephile and visionary, who imagined, planned, and produced the inaugural Westflix Film Festival as a high school senior in 2004. Now an Emmy–winning documentary film and television producer, Liz embraces film in all its possibilities. Each year she chooses a film for the Founder's Award that honors the legacy of the festival in its artistic risk taking, passion, and heart.

THE SALLY MENKE AWARD FOR EDITING

In our desire to make visible the role women play in the film industry, we celebrate the career of Sally Menke, who tragically passed away in 2010. She edited every Quentin Tarantino film and he called her his "only truly genuine collaborator." Menke is part of a grand tradition of female editors that includes Thelma Schoonmaker (RAGING BULL,) Verna Fields (JAWS,) Dede Allen (BONNIE AND CLYDE,) Dana Glauberman (JUNO,) Anne Coates (LAWRENCE OF ARABIA,) and Marie–Josèphe Yoyotte (THE 400 BLOWS,) among many others.

HUMANITARIAN AWARD

This award honors a film that improves people's lives by weaving stories and revealing truths about humanity. It inspires us to confront and reflect upon who we are and who we want to be.

THE CHERI GAULKE AWARD FOR VISUAL STORYTELLING

This accolade honors a person who, for decades, defined Visual Arts at Harvard–Westlake. A true visionary, an intersectional feminist, and a loving and generous instructor, Cheri Gaulke P'12 P'12 taught at Westlake School and then Harvard–Westlake from 1988 to 2019. She remains a highly respected and influential artist and filmmaker. This award is given to a film that captures Gaulke's love for original, quirky, brave storytelling. The winning film is recognized for its cultural impact beyond the screen and its ability to bring light to marginalized voices. The award itself employs an outsized replication of Gaulke's signature eyewear and, like the artist, is one of a kind.



TED WALCH AWARD FOR TEACHING AND MENTORSHIP

The Ted Walch award for Teaching and Mentorship honors the remarkable impact that high school teachers and community mentors of film production, video art, and/or cinema studies have on their students. \$1,500 will be given directly to the award

recipient to fund their school's film program and/or classroom equipment and facilitate a more accessible learning environment. This award honors Ted Walch, a universally beloved member of the Harvard-Westlake community with an exceptional passion for teaching and mentorship. A dedicated Westflix advisor for 19 years, Ted Walch passed away at the age of 80 in 2022.
